Birmingham's basketball fans have in store for them a big night tomorrow when the Maples play their final home game of the season here at Hazel Park. Before each game all the players will be present, and a program is being provided.

Birmingham is installing new metal backboards which will be ready for use Friday night. The area of the new backboards is much less than that of the old ones and should pave the way for greater accuracy among the Maples. These boards are like those used almost everywhere.

By scoring 13 points last Friday night against Mt. Clemens, Chuck Murray brought his season scoring total to 172 points, only 10 short of the record total he set last year. Unless he shows a few reverses in form, Chuck should break his own record here tomorrow night.

26,466 Street Lights
