League to Resist Any Weakening of Trade Program

The Birmingham League of Women Voters today announced that it will continue to work for international economic cooperation in the hope of counteracting the "rising tide of economic nationalism."

It will resist any attempts on the part of Congress to weaken or obstruct the reciprocal trade program, club president Mrs. Howard Liverance stated.

Mrs. H. M. Foley, chairman of the foreign policy committee of the Birmingham League, and members of her group, are making a detailed study of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements and the effect on domestic and world economy.

Their report, together with the plan for action on the subject by the Birmingham League, will be the subject of a League meeting in the near future.

Mrs. Liverance also stated that a letter setting forth the League's stand in supporting the present trade program was sent to Senator Arthur Vandenberg only last week.

Woman Kept Busy Lecturing on Trip to South America

Mrs. F. G. Garrison, formerly of Tottenham Rd., and back from a four-months' stay in South America, is being kept pretty busy these days telling interested audiences about her experiences South of the Border.

Last month she spoke before the Association of University Women about "Guatemala and Peru. This month she is expected to give specialized lectures on the economic and social conditions of South America for groups here, and in Pontiac.

The most informal talk, "Rediscovering South America," is to be given Thursday evening, Feb. 20, at Baldwin Public Library. Mrs. Garrison, having lived for several years in various countries of South America before the war, found many changes in political and economic structure. On the other hand, many of the customs, particularly in off-the-track communities, have changed little since the Spanish conquest.

Slide Film Depicting Economic Principles Shown to Committee
