### Swarthmore Guests at Sunday Breakfast

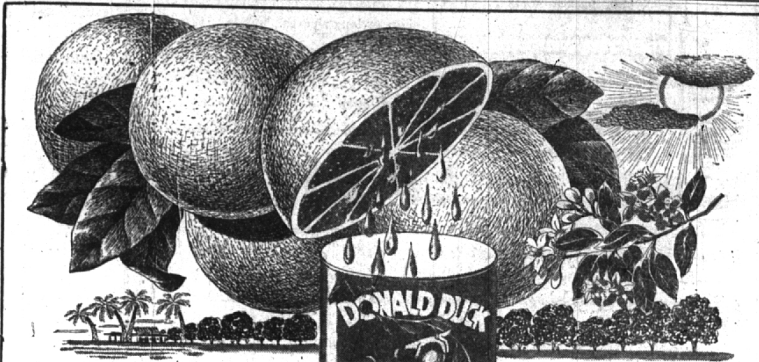
