wore a wine gabardine suit and a grey squirrel coat and hat for traveling. Her gloves and blouse were grey, as were her lizard shoes and bag.

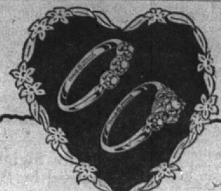
The couple will live in Washington, D. C., where Ensign Tiesel is stationed with the Bureau of Aeronautics in the Navy Dept.

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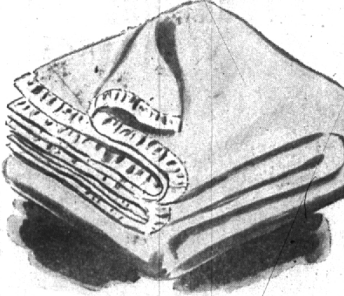
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
