Child Labor Law Reforms Backed by Local Groups

Spark of a new idea in promotion of needed legislation in this state has been struck by the Michigan Legislative Council, composed of the American Association of Social Workers, the American Association of University Women, the Council of Churches, the Junior League, the League of Women Voters, the Parent-Teachers Association and the Wesleyan Guild, joining forces to co-operate in particular legislative projects. First and foremost, the project is improved protective legislation in Michigan for the child worker now governed by an antiquated, inadequate law the groups feel.

The four local organizations which are members of the Council, are working actively together in this project. On the state Council, these organizations are represented by Mrs. Lawton C. Tabors of the American Association of University Women, Robert Lee Graham of the Junior League, Mrs. Peter Loomis of the League of Women Voters, and John C. Hammond of the Parent-Teachers Association.

According to these representatives, the child labor situation in Michigan is a typical example of an antiquated, inadequate law the groups feel.

Use 1909 Laws Michigan, they point out, ranks 40th among the states in the legal protection afforded its children. "Most of the existing law was written back in 1909. Revisions have been made from time to time but few of them. Last known change was in 1931, 16 years ago. Since then, repeated efforts by various individuals, organizations, churches and social agencies have been made to legislate improved working conditions for children, without success," the representatives declared.

Throughout the state, local meetings are being held to inform local communities about the present deplorable child labor situation and what to do about it. In Birmingham the Council's four member organizations are jointly planning such a community meeting for Monday afternoon, January 29, 1:30 p. m. at the Community House in hopes that every adult concerned with the welfare of children who work will attend.

"In almost every session of the legislative child labor bills are introduced but they always die in committee, said the Council's representatives.
