Although he is inventing "Just our knowledge of man, the human entity, is more adequate," Flores concluded, "so that we know how to work with him, how to call forth his willing cooperative efforts, our technological progress will achieve only part of the results aimed for."

"Man has become so absorbed in striving and inventing that he has largely lost track of himself as a mine of human possibilities—of creative energies and skills. Peace, security, economic expansion, and general wellbeing will hardly become realities until man rediscovers himself!" Flores concluded.
