Bridesmaids were Lillian Tebanusky and Jeanne Barthel of Detroit and Cora Joyce Lake of Bloomfield Hills.

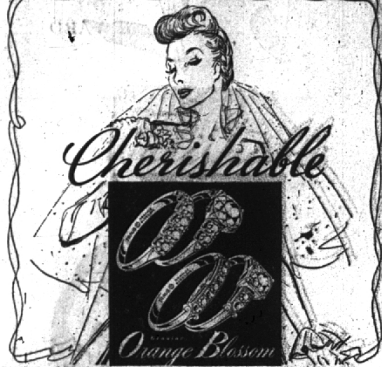

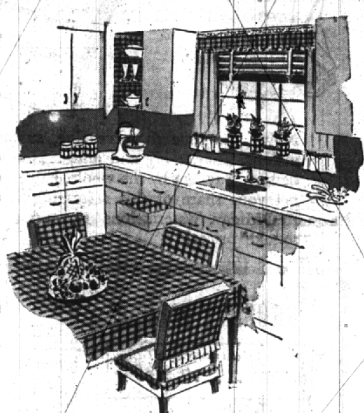
A musical show at the pool by the Rhythmairs will take place at 9:30 p. m. and dinner will be served from 1 to 10 with dancing till one o'clock.
