Faye Anderson's Letters to Her Parents Describe German Reaction to U. S.

Editor's Note: The following article, as well as others which will appear in subsequent issues, contains information which Miss Faye Anderson, former U. S. Army Red Cross recreational worker now in Europe, has included in letters to her parents. It is reprinted from Walter Anderson, 1140 Lake Park Drive. Miss Anderson tells many interesting facts concerning the attitude which the American occupational forces is accepted by the peoples of various European countries.

Faye Anderson, a local resident who is at present in Germany with the Red Cross Recreational Unit, a postwar U. S. Army Red Cross recreational worker now in Europe, has been writing to her family of her trips to different parts of Germany, France and Belgium and her encounters with the people of those countries.

Faye served during the war with the American Red Cross in the South Pacific, re-enlisted and then France and Belgium and her encounters with the people of those countries.

She believes this fully, and has become most interested in seeing different groups from both countries get together.

In one of her recent experiences, Faye asked a sculptor, who was well known before the war and had lost both his arms during the war, to give an exhibition.

Visits German Home
Pond weeks after the artist, Carl Fischer, lost his arms he decided to paint again. Applying paint to his nose he made several

unsuccessful attempts, but he didn't give up. His wife placed a pencil in his mouth and he has been painting in that manner ever since.

Faye claims that he has a unique style, and that his water-color, charcoal and pencil drawings are "wonderful."

During this exhibition Faye met friends with Fischer's instructor, a man whom she identified as Mr. Frederich, who invited her to the home of the concertmaster of the opera and symphony. This concertmaster, as Faye puts it, is a concert master, an artist on the cello and also a painter—quite a lot of talent for one person.
