How to Care for Your Baby's Foods

It is the wish of every parent to keep his child healthy and happy. One assurance of this natural desire is to provide the infant with clean and wholesome food. In these days of modern conveniences this is hardly a problem because refrigeration and the products of modern food industry are practically within everyone's standards.

After a baby is born, all learning progresses slowly and in gradual stages. So, too, in his physical make-up his body is not able to throw off infection as readily as an adult. Slowly through the first years of life he acquires a resistance to disease. Until that time his food and surroundings should be scrupulously clean and free from bacteria.

The most important fact to remember in the care of baby's food is this—keep it clean, keep it cool and keep it covered. In formula feedings the formula should be stored in the refrigerator in thoroughly washed sterile nursing bottles protected with sterile covers, stoppers or caps. This same attention should be practiced in caring for baby's sterile drinking water until ready for use. Just as in the milk feedings, the water is heated to the lukewarm stage before serving it to the baby.

To preserve the maximum content of Vitamin C in the infant's tomato and orange juices, as much air contact as possible should be eliminated. The open end of the tomato juice container may be tightly wrapped with clean waxed paper or protected with other types of clean covers. For better flavor and more Vitamin C content, squeezed orange juice should not be stored longer than twenty-four hours. Then the same storage precautions as taken with tomato juice containers should be employed. If half an orange is left over it may be set on a clean saucer with cut surface down.

As for Vitamin D sources contained in oil, refrigeration is of almost importance to prevent rancidity and to retain maximum vitamin content. Before placing these containers in the refrigerator wipe off the excess oil clinging to the outside with clean paper.

Commercially prepared strained cereals, vegetables, meats and desserts have been a boon to mothers for the last twenty-five years. However, in the care of the remaining portions of strained spinach, carrots and the other canned foods, mothers still observe the old fallacy of emptying canned foods into a container, other than the tin for storage. This is not necessary because the container and foods are sterile. All one need do is cover the original container with clean, waxed paper or other clean cover for storage in the refrigerator. Covering the food will prevent drying out and in vitamin retention and prevent absorption of flavors. In this manner the baby foods may be kept for two or three days. It is far better to use the original container for storage, because the dish into which the food might be emptied may be far from sterile. Some acids, such as iron stored in an open tin tend to dissolve iron which gives a metallic taste to the food. This condition is

not harmful nor dangerous to health.

Cans with dents or rust marks are safe unless they show signs of leakage. If leaks are present, do not use the food. Swelled tins are also outlaid; these swells denote the presence of a gas caused by food spoilage. Unopened tins of baby foods are best stored in a cool dry cellar or closet. Avoid storage near steam pipes, radiators, furnaces or kitchen ranges.
