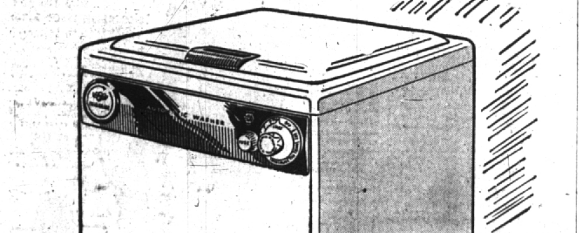

NOTICE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, August 18, 1947, at 8 o'clock P. M. a public hearing will be held in the Council Chamber of the City of Birmingham in the Municipal Building in the City of Birmingham to consider the amendment to Ordinance No. 221 by amending Section 401 (d) to read as follows:

Section 401 (d) Schools, colleges, buildings housing governmental functions and utilities of the City, County or State, and playgrounds, provided that any building in this district shall be so designed and maintained as to be in keeping with the general character of the immediate neighborhood.

And to add to Section 401 a sub-section to be known as Sub-Section (g) and to read as follows:

Section 401 (g) No fence of a height of more than three feet shall be erected on any property in this district in that portion of such property between the property line and the building setback line on any street. Provided that fence of a height of not to exceed a foot will be permitted, where such fence, including supports, does not obstruct vision as an extent greater than 15% of its total area, and where such fence is maintained free from vines which may obstruct vision.

Provided further, that for the protection of persons and property, fences of a height of not more than 7 feet, which do not obstruct vision to an extent greater than 25% of their total area, shall be permitted for the enclosing of public and institutional playgrounds and recreation areas. No fence in this district shall be constructed, either wholly or in part of barbed wire, nor shall there be maintained any fence carrying any electric current or charge of electricity.

And to add to said Ordinance No. 221 a new article to be known as Article 17-A and to read as follows:

**ARTICLE 17-A
PUBLIC PROPERTIES**

Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as a limitation upon the State of Michigan or any political subdivision thereof to use the land covered by it for any of its proper purposes.
