### Group to Leave For Teton Valley Ranch August 3

When the Mercury pulls out from Michigan Central Station in Detroit August 3, twelve local lassies will leave for a thrill-packed three weeks of western life at Teton Valley Girl's Ranch. The ranch, located at Jackson Hole, Wyoming, ("The last of the old West"), has attracted young folks from Birmingham for five years, who make the cross country trip under the capable direction of Mrs. Donald Murray of Tibury road, who has for those past five years taken a group of around 70 girls from all sections of the country out to Wyoming.

Many States Represented Although originally the group traveling West consisted of local youngsters, this year the states of New York, Ohio, Illinois, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Colorado, Minnesota and Wisconsin are represented.

Teton Valley, with its unexcelled view of the neighboring mountains, adjacent to the heavily timbered and game-infested Teton National Forest, bisected by one-and-a-half miles of a great trout stream, the Gros Ventre River, has been referred to by many as one of the most beautiful and unique ranches in the West.

Owned by Wendell Wilson Birmingham veterans of the ranch remark that the natural swimming pool fed by warm springs that keep the water at a temperature of 99 degrees winter and summer, make it one of Teton's most important features. It is owned and directed by Wendell S. Wilson, with his wife and two children, live in a ranch home near the main lodge. Wilson was formerly director of athletics at the University of Illinois, and has directed athletics at Cranbrook for the past four years.

### Each Girl Has Horse

Activities include riding (each girl has her own horse), a pack trip into a remote region of the valley, swimming, hiking, trout fishing, and a craftwork, photography, attending a rodeo, visiting Yellowstone National Park and taking part in chuck wagon supper.

### 10 Day Pack Trip

Mrs. Murray reports that a Saturday night visit to the town of Jackson, Idaho, 17 miles away from the ranch, is an experience the girls always enjoy.

During the first eight weeks of the summer Teton Valley is a ranch for boys, ages 10 through 17, while the girls take over in the second week in August. Following the regular camp period of three weeks, those who do not have to return to school remain for a ten-day pack trip.

Besides Mrs. Murray, two Birmingham girls, her daughter Doris and Elizabeth White, will go to the ranch as counselors.

The local girls planning to make the trip are Cynthia Booth and Mary Elizabeth Fisher of Bloomfield Hills, and Audrey Braun, Mary Gilchrist, Susan Halsted, Martha Miller, Nan Mosby, Joey Neff, Imogene Fowler, Jackie, Peggy Tollman and Mary Wilkinson of Birmingham.

Forty more girls will meet the group in Chicago with five additional counselors.
