Michigan Mirror
INTERPRETING THE NEWS

Here's another "first" for Michigan. Tourists coming to Northern Michigan need have no fear about dangers of untreated milk. Effective July 1, 1948, all milk offered for sale in Michigan, excepting that purchased direct at farms, must be pasteurized.

Why such a bill? Here are some facts. Since Jan. 1 of this year, 152 cases of undulant fever have been reported in Michigan. While not all of these cases were traceable to milk, many of them were so. Twelve years ago 106 cases of typhoid fever were the result of a typhoid "carrier" who worked in an Ann Arbor Dairy plant.

Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the division of disease control, state department of health, believes that the Michigan law will prevent the recurrence of any large-scale outbreak of milk-borne disease in the state. As such, it should safe-
