furs from ignorant trappers or ivor, from the denizens of Africa found it nec essary to carry only bales of bright colored cloth, glass beads and other trinkets. Today, the trader who goes to a country with educated citizens carries no such foolish cargo.

An effort is now being made to have Congress repeal the acreage-limitation provision under which the Federal Reclamation Bureau has limited the distribution of water to family-size farms. Critics assert that, if this happens, large land-holding interests will profit from the increased value of their low-priced, dry land.

There are serious implications in the repeal of the limitation, in that the trend toward monopoly, industrialized, absence-farming will develop undesirable social and economic cyils.

Taxes are the dollars you pay for the cost of operating those various units of government that serve you; they include everything from the national government to your local community. They never can be reduced very much except by the demands of informed citizens—informed enough to demand less services from government.

Mr. Acheson, according to those in a position to know, is enjoying his job and has the confidence and respect of his superiors and, in recent months, exercised considerable discretion and responsibility in his post.

His resignation calls attention again to the fact that top-level jobs in the Government are woefully underpaid. The officials upon whom the nation largely depends for the direction of its affairs find hemselves able to secure much greater sums in private life. Mr. Acheson, it is said, has had years of varied law experience and is able to earn around \$100,000 a year in his profession.

He thinks that recreation planning will have to take into account the desires of older persons, that travel should increase and books and concerts become more popular.
