Orchard Lake Country Club To Note 20th Anniversary

Robert N. Woodruff, president of the Orchard Lake Country Club, announces that the 20th anniversary of the club's founding will be celebrated with a birthday party and dinner dance on Aug. 2. The property for the club, 178 acres, was donated by the late Willis C. Ward, its founder and first president, and long-time resident of this area. In the summer of 1926 work was started on the golf course, with a London firm, Colt and Allen, engaged to handle the project. Capt. C. H. Allison, whose fame was international in this line, had laid out the Pine Valley course at Philadelphia and the Briarcliff and Knollwood courses in Chicago, as well as many famous ones in England, Scotland and France. He came to Birmingham and gave his personal supervision to this now-famous Orchard Lake course. Today it is rated as not only one of the best in the Detroit area, but as one of the ten best in the country by professional golfers who have played it. The first game was played there on Aug. 3, 1927. According to Woodruff, "The club membership at that time was 150, and there was no clubhouse. Tents were used for the locker rooms and pro shop until the spring of 1930, when the present building was completed. The membership today exceeds 400." Sailing far out-dates the other activities of the club. The Orchard Lake Sailing Club was formed in 1896, and its first race held on Aug. 8. An old clipping of the Detroit Free Press reveals that on Aug. 7, 1896, the Detroit and Milwaukee railway ran a special train from Detroit to Orchard Lake to bring visitors to the race. The club remained active until World War I, when military and industrial activities occupied the membership almost completely. The first group of sailors used the Butterfly fleet which Mr. Ward had acquired for his young friends. In 1928 this was replaced by a fleet of 11 Aykroyd dinghies, and later by the present fleet of 12 Comets now in use with a supplemental fleet of lesser craft. Today Orchard Lake Country Club is one of the country's immortals. In addition to this and the boating facilities it offers swimming, four tennis courts, and the beautiful clubhouse. The chairs and appointments of the latter have made the club the gathering place of nearly a generation of Orchard Lake Country Club members, their families and friends.
