

Complete Final Arrangements for Holy Name Jubilee

Highlighting a three-day celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Holy Name Catholic Church, will be the annual Field Mass during which the favor of the Papal Blessing from Rome will be read, at noon Sunday in the Municipal Park.
