Conservation Department Field Trip of Michigan Attended by Local Woman

As the guest of the Conservation Department of the State of Michigan, Dawn Renee Haugan attended the two-day field trip sponsored by the conservation committee of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, and will give a complete report of her trip to the group when it convenes in the fall.

As the guest of the department she learned that one of the chief objectives of the conservation department is that through these field trips and their conservation workshops, outdoor laboratories where clubwomen, teachers and other interested persons may spend from two days to several weeks learning to know water, soil, wildlife, plants and forests and their relation to the daily life of every citizen, they may reach the homes of those attending, then work through the clubs, the communities and then the state, not only to conserve and protect but to increase each and every natural resource of Michigan.

It was pointed out that so that this work may be carried out in the schools, in many communities the federated garden clubs have given scholarships to send a teacher to the Training School at Higgins Lake. The next school of this kind will be held the week of June 22. In some cases the school board has sent teachers, and individuals have donated the scholarships. Any teacher interested may be contacted by the Michigan Division of Education, Department of Conservation, Lansing, Michigan.

"The vastness of the conservation program was clearly brought to light," said Mrs. McKinney, "during our field trip through the northern part of the lower peninsula. We had a chance to see every phase of the program in practical use."

"Soon after leaving the training school we viewed the Higgins Lake State Park, the first of the state forests to be put under active management by the conservation department."

Since 1904, 17,263 acres in that area have been reforested. Throughout the state millions of acres of land unsuited for agriculture have been made into forests by the Forestry Division of the Department of Conservation. "This affects every citizen of the state in the establishment of these forests is to protect the land and its renewable resources and to provide a steady flow of products and employment in local communities," she said.

Another duty of the Forestry Division is protection from forest fire, and the fire towers that are manned during the fire season from April to October, play a key part in the efficient forest fire control organization of Michigan, protecting both state and private lands, she learned while visiting one of the state's many fire towers.

A small part of the Water Division of Conservation was seen at a group camp post at the Ogeuse River, where students the Michigan State College and conservation officers were studying the danger of the lamprey eel weir, which is a serious menace to the fishing industry on the Lakes, hav-
