Phister Awarded Zoellin Trophy

Climaxing his career as a brilliant high school athlete, Jac Phister, captain of both the cross-country and track teams, was awarded the "Bucky" Zoellin Memorial trophy for the second year at the track banquet Tuesday night.

Phister received 910 points on the basis of his 150.9 time for the 440-yard dash, the state record. He has been state champion in this event two years.

Taking second place with 622 points was Dick Groves who put the shot 46 ft., 10 in., to take the State championship this year.

Trailing Groves by only 22 points was Bob Littleton, who finished sixth in both the low and the high hurdles at State but due to the fast time of both races picked up 600 points on performance.

Other members of the squad who figured on a point basis were Duane Murphy, second in his heat of the 440; Chuck Murray, broad jump; Rodney Smith and Bill Hickman, miles.
