Mrs. Cyril Lewis Named to Board Of Directors

Mrs. Cyril Lewis has recently been named a member of the board of directors of the National Institute of Diaper Service.

Back in 1930, the same year that the Community House moved from the small frame building on the corner of Maple and Bates to the newly dedicated building at its present location, Mrs. Lewis took over the position previously held by George Yaple, which made her the first woman director of the House. She served in this capacity for three years.

The year before Mrs. Lewis had returned to Birmingham from a trip to Washington, D. C. to find she had been nominated for the village commission. A few weeks later, she was elected and had the distinction of being the first woman member of the commission in the history of Birmingham.

Fourteen years ago, she and her husband founded the Dydee Wash in Detroit, which furnishes sterilized diapers in Detroit and the surrounding vicinity.

Both she and Mr. Lewis have been members of the National Institute of Diaper Service since its foundation over seven years ago. When she was named a member of the board of directors she became the first woman to serve in this capacity.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis are planning to attend the board meeting of the group in Chicago.

Born in Fenton, Mrs. Lewis came to Birmingham in 1903 and graduated from the high school here in 1919. She is also a graduate of the University of Michigan, and was a teacher of French in the high school for two years.
