### SCF Drive Begins As Volunteers Take to Field

Inspired by a recent report of Dr. Howard Kershner, chairman of the overseas division of the Save the Children Federation, a voluntary committee was formed in Birmingham under the auspices of the Birmingham branch of the SCF with the express purpose of raising money to adopt five village schools in Europe at \$150 per school.

Unsolicited gifts by people who have heard of the committee, totaling \$100, have already come in to the chairman of the voluntary committee, Mrs. Philip H. Prezz. Other donations have been promised even though solicitation work of the committee is just getting under way this week.

Twelve hundred schools in Europe have so far been adopted through the SCF by other citizens in the United States, but 1,000 more are on the list for adoption according to Kershner, and each is in need of an American sponsor.
