Home Owners Must Pay for Moving City Improvements

Property owners should stand the cost of moving such improvements as fire plugs, catch basins and trees that construction on private property necessitates moving, City Manager Donald C. Egbert has told city commissioners.

Egbert's recommendation was made because several persons have approached various city officials asking that the city stand the cost of such moving.

"When the city installs such improvements along its street in unimproved areas, it is not possible to foresee future developments," Egbert said in his report. "These improvements are placed at the points which appear to be the best location possible at the time the improvement is installed."
