They do not make allowance, in our opinion, for the circulation of news which today reports more fully the immoral and criminal acts of social exceptions.

State, is current news throughout the nation

State where it occurred.

The same observation applies, we think, to
news items that depict immorality. People
in the public eye, and they number thousands, have little privacy as the public demands the most intimate details of their lives.
Publicity given to such incidents easily persuades individuals that immoral practices are
