Spring refurbishing of the Birmingham Community House is in process on a postwar scale which includes new kitchen and dining equipment as well as long awaited furnishings for the Mary Griffin upstairs lounge.

A complete new gas range will be installed as soon as ovens can be obtained for the unit. Hotel size and adequate for the many thousands of meals prepared each month in the Community House kitchen, it is the gift of the Detroit Michigan Stove Co.

A new six-compartment deep freeze unit, a gift of the Frigidite Co., has recently been installed in the commissary storeroom and is in use, as well as a giant-size Norge refrigerator, which was also a donation to the Community House. Another kitchen improvement recently made is additional sink space.

Installation of a new check room is now completed in the main lobby of the Community House a display case has been built into the wall to contain jewelry and ceramic objects created in the newly organized handicraft studio.
