

### Fritz Goro Exhibit At Institute from May 1 Through 15

Cranbrook Institute of Science has arranged a showing of "Photographing Science," one of a series of photographic exhibitions prepared by the editors of Life Magazine, beginning May 1 and continuing through May 15.

The exhibition consists of eighty photographs by Life's Fritz Goro. Enlarged and mounted on 8" x 28" panels, each of the pictures records an important moment in the history of scientific achievement.

Goro, one of the pioneers in photographing science, has also pioneered in devising methods to photograph the elusive manifestations of science. As against the new dimensional effect of micro-photography, he has developed what he calls "macro-photography" which takes tiny objects below the point of vision and photographs them in their environment.

He is credited with being the first to photograph such scientific phenomena, and his historic photograph of atom splitting made in 1939 is included in this exhibition of his work.

Visitors are welcome at the Cranbrook Institute of Science daily between two and five.

In its annual business meeting in Ann Arbor, held Saturday in connection with the Schoolmasters Meeting, the Michigan Council of Teachers of English elevated Carl G. Wonnberger, head of the English department at Cranbrook School, from vice-president to president.

Wonnberger, who has held the presidency of the State English teachers four times within the past ten years, succeeds Miss Eva Van Houten of Detroit.

At Cranbrook for the past eighteen years, Wonnberger is director of the Theatre School and a national adviser to Quill and Scroll, honorary journalistic society.

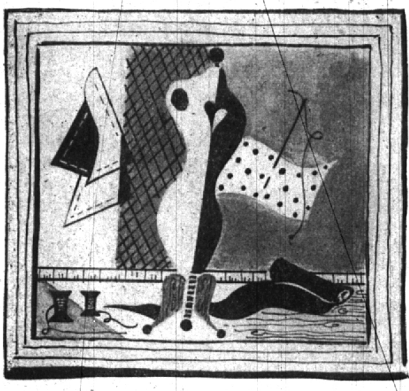
