Mrs. Walls chose for her son's wedding a tulle suit with which she wore brown accessories.

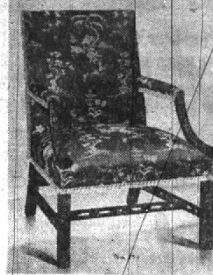
A reception in the church parlors followed the ceremony. The couple will live at 3848 Robin avenue in Berkeley.
