Child Psychiatrist to Speak at Meeting of County Society
Second meeting of the recently organized Oakland County Society of the State Mental Hygiene Society will be held Monday, May 19, at 8 p. m. at St. John's Episcopal Church, 11 Mile and Woodward. Mrs. Henry Booth, chairman, announced this week's speaker of the evening, Dr. Samuel W. Hartwell, nationally known child psychiatrist and for over a year assistant director of Michigan's State Department of Health, will be the speaker of the evening.
Dr. Hartwell is responsible for the direction of Michigan's ten child guidance clinics. He will discuss the relationship between child guidance clinics and a broad preventive program in the mental hygiene field.
The clinic in Pontiac serves Oakland and Macomb counties and is available to all children in that area showing behavior disturbances.
The local chapter recognizes the clinic as one of the positive things already being done in Oakland County, but feels that the community served should know more about the function and use of the clinic in order to insure the support and expansion of an existing resource for mental health.

Tell How Money from Poppy Sales is Distributed

Where does the money go that the American Legion and its Auxiliary raise year after year in the sale of poppies? The local American Legion and the Legion as a whole, explained the question which no doubt many Birminghamers asked themselves as they are confronted with the poppy and the can in which the drug donations.
"All funds raised by this means are used entirely for rehabilitation and child welfare," Brown pointed out. "Two of the prizes felt to be most worthwhile by both organizations."
"The Michigan Department of the Legion alone has cared for 2,004 children in homes and 1,042 in institutions throughout the State last year with a total expenditure of \$177,756 of Legion and Auxiliary funds. The total amount came from a total collected by sale of poppies of \$1,766,550."
The money is used to care for children, here, Legion and its auxiliaries in Michigan spent an estimated \$4,000 throughout the state for veteran rehabilitation.
To bring a little cheer to the veterans in hospitals throughout the State, the legion organization has planned rehabilitation programs.
"At Christmas time last year, 3,398 veterans were remembered with a gift. A "Gift Show" was conducted for veterans hospitalized at the Veterans' Administration No. 109 in Fort Custer where 1,107 men were allowed to select any number of gifts for their loved ones and to purchase with their "Merry Christmas" wishes, all without cost to the veterans.
Birthdays Are Remembered
Brown told of the monthly service of remembering birthdays, necessities which are not furnished by the government, but are distributed to the 40 hospitals in the State by the Legion.
Each month, too, he stated, a birthday party is held at the Veterans' facility and American Legion hospitals in Belle Creek when any veteran who has had a birthday during the previous month is feted and given a gift.
"The majority of the child welfare funds are used to help individuals in private homes throughout the state," he said, "but one of our principal projects in the American Legion children's club is at Otter Lake."
"These children under 12 years of age—sons and daughters of World War I and II veterans—are eligible for care if they are indigent."
Buy's Capital Equipment
"The State of Michigan gives the bill an appropriation every year for general expenses; but this does not include any money for capital outlay, building repairs, new equipment or building maintenance. Therefore, it is up to the Legion units to provide the money for these expenditures."
Brown also said that during the past year the American Legion's auxiliary, the 40 8's, and 8's at 40, have raised \$20,000 to purchase and install all new laundry equipment, water softener, air compressor, hot-water tank and a new high pressure steam boiler there.
"The poppy sales provide money for all that rehabilitation work," Brown said, "but many of the individual Legion units carry numerous other philanthropies with the money obtained for the general fund."
