Accept Paintings for Nat'l Contest

Paintings of three students of the Cranbrook Academy of Art have been accepted for "Paintings of the Year" Pepsi-Cola's fourth annual art competition, it was announced this week.

Kyle Morris of Austin, Tex., submitted "Early Spring," an oil and shiva painting depicting flower pickers in a spring landscape setting. "Saw Mill" was entered by Madison F. Mitchell of Meridian, Miss., from sketches he made in the South and executed in oil at Cranbrook, and Matthew Briner of Detroit selected "Landscape," a reflective oil study, for his entry.

These paintings will now be eligible for other honors and awards.

"Paintings of the Year" will be exhibited at the National Academy of Design in New York City in the autumn of 1947 and then make a six-month tour of the United States.

Entries from Cranbrook were sent to the regional jury at Chicago, judged by Jean Le Lorraine Albright, Boris Anisfeld and Jerry Bywaters.

Open to all artists in the United States and possessions, paintings must have been completed during the last two years to be eligible for this competition.

The sponsor is endeavoring to provide substantial and healthy encouragement to the development of contemporary art.
