

Current Series of Vesper Programs Will End Sunday

Last vesper service of the season will be held at Christ Church Cranbrook Sunday, May 25, at 4:30 p.m., with music selected from two of the early Flemish and Dutch composers, Sweelinck and Leeliet.

Services will again be given each Sunday throughout the winter and spring.
To be initiated June 1 and to carry on each Sunday afternoon at the same time as the vesper services, will be a series of carillon recitals.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 348

City of Birmingham

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 349 BEING AN AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCE BY CHANGING THE ELECTION MEMBER REPRESENTED IN SAID ORDINANCE FROM "122-a" TO "122-b".

This Ordinance Number 348 be, and it hereby is hereby amended to read as follows:

ANY ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 122 OF THE City of Birmingham outside "Traffic Ordinance" by adding to Article VI thereof a new section, the City of Birmingham Ordinance:

This Ordinance No. 238 of the City of Birmingham entitled "Traffic Ordinance" be and the same is hereby amended by adding to Article VI thereof a new section to be known as Section 122-b, to read as follows:

Section 122-b. In any proceeding for violation of the parking provisions of this Article, being Sections 185 to 192 inclusive of Article VI of Ordinance 238 of the City of Birmingham or any rule or regulation adopted pursuant to the provisions of said Article, the registration plate displayed on such motor vehicle shall constitute in evidence a prima facie presumption that the owner of such motor vehicle was the person who parked or placed such motor vehicle at the point where such violation occurred.

This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon publication following the passage hereof.

Made and passed by the Commission of the City of Birmingham this 19th day of May, A.D. 1947.
