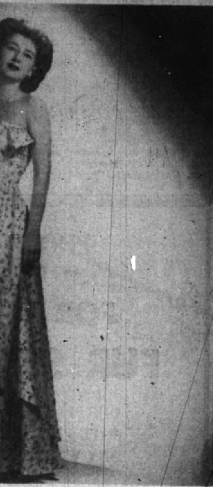
Jessie Bowes to Graduate from Geneva College
