### How to Transplant Vegetables, Flowers Is Told by Expert

Transplanting vegetable and flower plants can mean thousands of dollars in savings, according to county agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey. Space, time and seed are all conserved when careful transplanting is done, he said. "When a plant is transplanted, it is set back slightly in its development. If plants are in flats, practice blocking them. A week before they are to be transplanted, cut through the soil between plants each way with an old casting knife. Make the cuts just like cutting square of cake. Repeat this about the middle of the week and again just before transplanting. Roots will be confined to the square of soil and less injury at transplanting time will result.

**Don't Break Roots**  
Whether plants are in pots, blocked out in flats or in a seed row in a coldframe or garden, water them well before moving them. This will help them withstand the shock of transplanting," he advised.

Plants should be lifted carefully to avoid breaking roots. If roots are exposed and almost bare of soil, dip them in a muddy mixture of water and soil.
