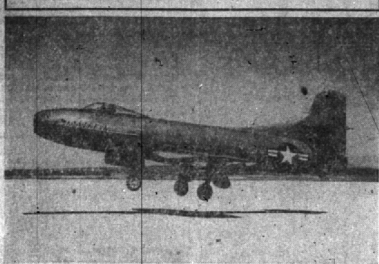


SKYSTREAKS TO RECORD



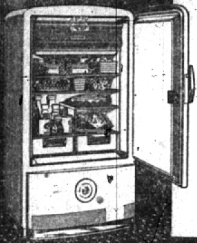

FIRST PICTURE OF THE NEW HUDSON



This first picture of the new-model Hudson automobiles shows the Commodore Eight six-passenger coupe. Brought to the public at a cost of \$16,000,000, the new Hudson combines for the first time in any motor car a low center of gravity with increased interior roominess and a passenger compartment cradled between the axles. The new car has a lower center of gravity than any other American auto-

mobile. It is only five feet from the ground to its top. It provides more handroom than any other mass-produced automobile. It is a car "which upon entering, you step down into, not up on." It has the roomiest seat. It provides a passenger compartment completely cradled between the axles, with rear-seat passengers sitting not only ahead of the rear axle, but completely ahead of the rear wheels.

Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS

Mrs. Sheldon Noble, of Birmingham, coordinator of community service to camps and hospitals for the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross attended an important meeting of the Port Custer Council on Wednesday, November 5th, taking with her a large number of needed articles for the hospitals. These items, collected by the local camp and hospital committee, included 80 game prizes, candy bars, cigarettes, books, and, in answer to a specific request, electric light extension cords furnished by the Rochester Blue Star Mothers. In addition, the Committee has recently wrapped and shipped 200 gift packages for servicemen who will be on the high seas at Christmas.

The camp and hospital committee of the Oakland County Chapter belongs to two councils for service to nearby military installations and veterans' hospitals, the Port Custer Council and the Detroit Area Council. And its purpose is to supplement the equipment and necessary items for the servicemen or veteran that the government cannot supply. These are provided by channeling gifts and funds from organizations and in-

dividuals in the community through the local chapter.

At the moment, the local camp and hospital committee is working on the following projects: supplying recreational equipment, bingo prizes, magazine subscriptions, books and new victrola records for Port Custer, as well as the other installations and veterans' hospitals in the area.

The Committee is also interested in the planting program which will be undertaken in the spring at the Dearborn Veterans' Hospital by all communities in Michigan.

Individuals or organizations who wish to contribute are urged to donate trees, shrubs, or group plantings, which may be given as memorials if desired.

The local committee is currently organizing material for the forthcoming Christmas program. The following items are needed to brighten up the holidays for men and women in Percy Jones General Hospital and the Dearborn Veterans Hospital, gift packages for patients, including both men and women; gifts for enlisted duty soldiers and WACs; Christmas tree decorations; pine boughs, holly and pine cones for decorating wards, recreation rooms, etc.; gift wrappings, paper gift ribbons, seals and enclosure cards. With Christmas just around the corner, the Red Cross would deeply appreciate any contributions as soon as possible. 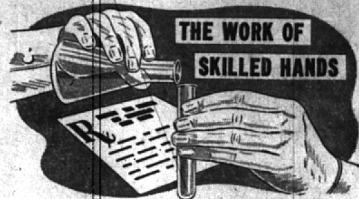
