# Our Local Mail Delivery

Four months ago—or on July 28—two U. S. postal inspectors working under the direction of the Chicago district office, visited the Birmingham post office, studied its procedure, and made certain recommendations to Washington for the improvement of local service.

According to Birmingham Postmaster Joseph Byrne, the recommendations included the extension of certain city and clivery routes to service residents who presently are always required to call at the general delivery window at the post coffice for their mail. This will add 148 new stops to present city mail routes, Byrne explained.

But the service isn't being given yet. Approval must ome from Washington first.

The Eccentric is interested in why, within the past four months, this approval has not been forthcoming. Ordinar-ily, a postal inspector's recommendation, we understand, needs only formal approval by Washington.

The Eccentric has written a letter to our Congressional representative, the Hon. George A. Dondero of Royal Oak, explaining the situation to him and asking for his assistance in obtaining the recommended mail delivery

We suggest that local residents who have some postal matter which they believe merits consideration, to also write Congressman Dondero so that he may be able to follow through immediately on each of the matters.
