Peace Plate Recipes and Suggestions

CHEESE FONDUE

2 1/2 cups milk / 1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups coarse bread crumbs / dash cayenne pepper
1 1/2 cups grated American cheese / 4 eggs separated

Scald milk and let cool. Then add crumbs, grated cheese, salt, and cayenne. Slowly stir in the beaten egg yolks. Then pour in the egg whites, beaten until stiff but not dry. Pour into a greased 2-quart casserole. Set in pan of warm water and bake in a moderate (350°) oven 1 1/2 hours or until the fondue is set and is a delicate brown. Serve at once. Serves 6 to 8. To serve 8 or 4 use half the recipe.

Buttered cabbage may be given an added touch by sprinkling each serving with crisp toasted cubes of bread. Don't over-cook cabbage — saves its color, flavor, and food value by cooking tightly covered, in only enough water to keep from burning. 8 minutes for shredded cabbage and 15 minutes for wedges.

BRAISED LAMB SHANKS AND NOODLES

3 lamb shanks / 1 cup sliced green onions
1/4 cup flour / 1 small green pepper, seeded and sliced
3 teaspoon salt / 1 1/2 quarts boiling water
1/2 teaspoon pepper / 1/2 lb. wide noodles

Have your butcher cut each shank into three pieces. Combine flour with 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Roll meat in this mixture, and brown thoroughly on all sides in the hot fat. Then add onions and green pepper, and brown slightly. Add boiling water, remaining 2 tps. salt, cover and simmer for 1 hour. Then skim off excess fat, add noodles, cover and continue cooking about 20 minutes or until noodles are tender. Serve shanks in center of platter with noodles and gravy around them. Serves 5 to 6.

APPLE CRUMBLE PIE

6 large tart apples, sliced and pared / 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 unbaked pie shell / 1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup sugar / 1/4 cup side flour
teaspoon salt / 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon / 1/2 cup nuts, sliced

Arrange sliced apples in pie shell and cover with mixture of sugar, salt, spices, and lemon juice. Mix brown sugar and flour. Cut in butter fine. Add nuts. Sprinkle over apples. Bake in hot oven (400°) 1 hour.
