Victorian Drama to Be Shown on December Dates

Made famous by such stage stars as Maude Adams, Eva Le Gallienne and Helen Hayes, the Sir James M. Barrie play, "What Every Woman Knows," will be the next presentation of the St. Dunstan's Guild of Cranbrook group. The lead will be played by Mrs. Jones B. Shannon, as "Maggie Wylie," and Fred C. Pew as "John Shand." In the supporting roles will be Roy Leitch as "James Wylie"; Lewis C. Keenan, "Alick Wylie"; William Crawford, "David Wylie"; Maxine Appell, "Lady Sybil Tensenden"; Mrs. Donald S. Bell, "La Comtesse de la Briere"; Mark Parker, "Bolton"; and Templeton Lockicker, "Charles Venables."

Lewis B. McMechan is directing the play, which had considerable experience in this field through his work with the players groups at Westland and Marlborough, Mass., and brings to the local group a sensitive interpretation of the difficult roles.

The stage settings have been prepared by J. Edward Luder, well known architect, with the assistance of Mrs. Richard F. Hindermeister, local artist, who has added much to the Victorian touch through her talent.

The play will be presented in the Cranbrook Pavilion, which for the past year has been the "home" of the St. Dunstan's group.

The story of the Pavilion, itself, has a touch of the theatrical, for it is the direct result of a cloudburst.

On the evening of the formal opening of the Cranbrook Greek Theater, in 1918, the audience sat enthralled, watching the performance of "The Cranbrook Masque," written especially for the occasion by Sam Hume. Suddenly, with little warning, a torrential rain fell, and the drenched audience had no place whatever to go for shelter. George W. Booth, who had already done so much for the Cranbrook area, saw the need for some place in which plays could be presented and the audience protected from the weather.

Work was started at once on the Pavilion, and for some time this majestic domed roof, supported by huge, handsome columns, supplied this need. Later the present walls were erected, filling the space between the columns, and for several years the Pavilion was the scene of many local events, flower shows, exhibits and receptions of various kinds.

Late in 1946 St. Dunstan's Guild promptly took over the building and have had it as their head-
