Dr. Nina Mangus  
to Speak on DAR  
at Ellis Island

Dr. Nina A. Mangus, state chairman for Ellis Island will be the guest speaker next Tuesday, when Piety Hill Chapter, DAR, holds its 32nd meeting at the home of Mrs. Dale Miller of Waddington road.

Dr. Mangus will show motion pictures of the island, and exhibit articles made there.

In 1934 the Federal Government asked the Daughters of the American Revolution to take charge of the occupational therapy program on the island. Immigrants entering this country are often held there for weeks, awaiting the final disposition of their cases.

In the past they were given nothing to do, and by the time they were admitted to the States, or as sometimes happened, returned to their homelands, they were often terrified and in many cases mentally ill from dread and inactivity. Since the occupational therapy program was installed, this condition has been greatly lessened, and a far better morale is maintained.

There are three full time, and one part time, workers in the employ of the DAR there, now, with several volunteer workers always available.

Dr. Mangus will discuss these and other phases of the work, touching on the number of articles which are made on the island and sold by the Chapters through-

out the country. She will also tell of the work the DAR does among the people held there, to prepare them for citizenship when their admittance finally becomes official.

The meeting, which will be presided over by Mrs. Thomas Navin regent, will begin at 2 o'clock. Mrs. Miller will be assisted in her duties as hostess by Mrs. Walter A. Kinsert, Mrs. Erwin E. Darling, Mrs. Charles Butters, Mrs. Robert T. Garrison, Mrs. Delbert James and Mrs. C. Haddell Smith.

Program Based on  
Life of Liszt to  
Be Given Here

Mrs. Carl Binkle and Mrs. John Abbott will present a program at the First Methodist Church on Wednesday, Nov. 12, on the life of Franz Liszt.

Mrs. Binkle, who is very well known in Birmingham for her excellent book reviews and historical writings, will tell the history of the great composer's life with numerous comments on his many famous compositions. She will sketch in the modes and conditions of the time in which he lived, showing many of the effects his surroundings had upon his music.

Mrs. Abbott has selected five of his better known works for her piano solos. She will play "My Sweet Repose," "Du bist die Ruh," "Hark, Hark, the Lark!" (Morgens tanzen), "Consolation Numbers 4 and 5," and "Liebestraume." She is studying at present with Helen Wagner de Bruyn, and was once a piano pupil of Edward Bredahl of Detroit. Mrs. Binkle's commentary will include impor-

tant highlights concerning the writing of these pieces, also.

This is the third year that Mrs. Binkle and Mrs. Abbott have presented such a program, having given a similar one on Chopin and Grieg, both of which proved very popular with all who heard them. The programs which they have already given on Liszt, at Grone Pointe and Huntington Woods, have also received much favorable comment, and the committee in charge urges all to attend.

The meeting will begin at 1 o'clock, with members of the Kate Wagner group in charge of the dessert luncheon. Mrs. Cora Amerland will lead the devotional period.
