"I don't think we need to live in a crisis all the time, because the world isn't going to pot at all unless we want it to."  
C. F. Kettering, retired vice-president of General Motors Corporation in charge of research and now its research consultant, was speaking.  
The occasion was the 14th annual meeting of the Associated Press Managing Editors' association in Detroit. News executives of daily newspapers throughout the United States were in attendance.  
"Boss" Kettering's remarks, "The Day after Tomorrow," were an affirmative, positive reminder that Detroit's "know how" of making things through mass production was achieved only by competitive free enterprise and that we still live in "the golden age of opportunities unlimited."  
"Since I have retired," he said, "I have organized several new companies. One is the Utopian Transportation Company, Limited, and that is a non-profit organization. I am trying to raise a few funds, and you can help in your little community, to give free transportation to those people who think this is a lousy country.  
"The only thing about the Utopian Transportation Company that is limited is that the transportation is limited to one direction.  
"The other company I have is a stock-selling company known as United States Preferred. I am trying to sell them, and I am getting along pretty well. Of course, a poor inventor like myself doesn't understand a lot of things that are going on, and apparently other people don't either.  
"One of the things I don't understand is why this country is called upon to make up the deficits for all the cockeyed European ideologies, and stop our own work while we are doing it. I don't understand that one at all.  
"We didn't start this war, we just got in and tried to help a little. I was talking to Harvey Campbell this morning, and he said, "You are all wrong." He said, "If a fellow is in the gutter, you either have to get in with him or help him out." I said, "No, not if he put himself in there. I don't intend to get into the ditch at all, and most of the fellows in the ditch would have had us there, so I can't be too sympathetic.  
"When it comes to starving, I would like to help on that a little bit, but it is not a part of that get sentimental over the guys that were trying to lick us. I can't get sentimental over that at all.  
"So when I talk about United States Preferred, that is what I mean."  
Kettering's remarks, philosophical and often humorous, were timely because they served to remind us that America's greatness has been built on the development and use of superior machines. According to an survey, the averageworking man in America is \$6,000. Who is going to put up this \$6,000? Any citizen who is willing to save money and to risk it as an investment for profit.  
Back in 1870 the average American worker worked 60 hours a week. He earned \$3.60. Compared with 1947 real dollars,

that would be worth \$16.56. In 1908 he got \$12 a week for 60 hours' work. Today, he gets \$60 a week and works 40 hours—all because of the American system of free enterprise, making money for profit.  
There is no place in the world where this is true. So, don't let the United States short itself in calm or other European states. Why not buy a few shares in Kettering's United States Preferred?

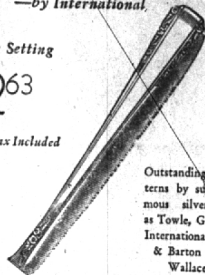
