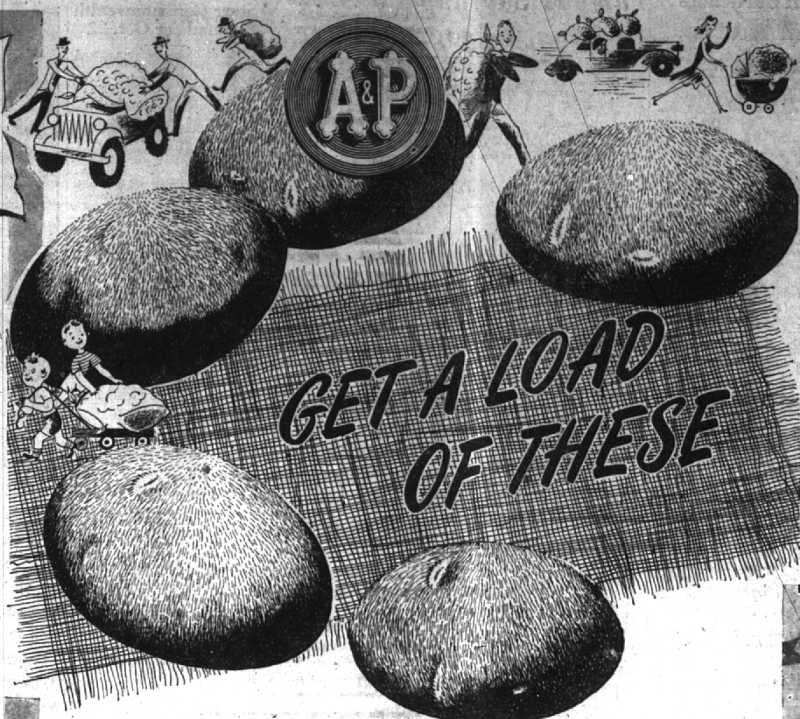

**Speech by Local GM Executive to Highlight Meeting**

L. C. Goad, 1090 Glenhurst, vice president of General Motors and general manager of the Fisher Body Division, will be the principal speaker at a three-day conference this week of the American Society of Training Directors. Subject of his talk will be "Training as a Capital Investment."

The training directors, convening at the Hotel Bock Cadillac, will number approximately 600. The membership is made up of educational and training specialists from the United States and Canada, and the Hawaiian Islands, who work in all types of industrial operations, instructing students, apprentices, foremen and supervisors in subjects ranging from calculus and metallurgy to human relationships.

Goad's talk, to be made at the principal banquet on Oct. 16, will highlight the conference. Reports of new teaching techniques and a review of the problems and opportunities confronting training directors will comprise the remainder of the program.

The plan for each of the ten lessons is to co-ordinate certain muscle joints with inner functions such as the respiratory system, nerves etc., and to promote relaxation. Tiredness and nervous tension soon disappear when following the simple routines, Mrs. Enoch says.
