Home Is Where a Man Sleeps

Kuhn Exhibition at Cranbrook Until November 10

Opening last week at the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art was an exhibition of 24 paintings of Walt Kuhn, contemporary American painter. Colorful figures from circus life, landscapes and still life are portrayed.

Honest, straightforward presentation—penetrating analysis of the character of the subject and simple, forceful technique, have been the guiding factors in Kuhn's art. Few careers in the history of American painting have been marked by such intensity of purpose and rigorous adherence to an ideal.

As a young man, he left his native New York to seek the West, earning a livelihood through various means—bicycle riding, cartooning and show business. Without formal art training, he traveled extensively in Europe, where the importance of new ideas in painting, especially as seen in France, inspired him to study and research.

Today, at the age of sixty-six, he continues to view dispassionately and with comprehensive vision the art of our time.

Here Till Nov. 10 Organized and circulated by the Colorado Springs Fine Arts College, the Kuhn exhibition has been shown at the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center, San Francisco Museum of Art, Santa Barbara County Museum of Art, Los Angeles Memorial in Omaha, and will remain in the Main Gallery of the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art until November tenth.

Visitors are welcome at the Museum daily, except Mondays, between two and five.
