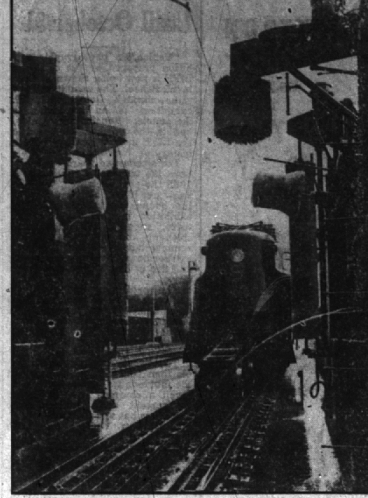
Miss Ylva McGuffin, journalism instructor, will accompany the group on the all-day trip.
