Rev. Emil Kontz Candidate For Local Pastorate

The Rev. Emil Kontz of Chicago, candidate pastor, preached his first sermon in the First Baptist Church Sunday morning.
He is serving as executive secretary of the Home Missions committee of the Northern Baptist convention, which has its offices in Chicago, and has also supervised the juvenile protection program of the convention there. He comes to the local church as a candidate and as one of the outstanding speakers of the Northern convention, having spoken in all of the principal cities on the United States as a representative of the convention.
Mr. Kontz is a graduate of Bucknell University, Franklin and Marshall college and the University of Budapest in Hungary. He studied at the latter university after winning a scholarship from the Institute of International Education through his excellent scholastic record at Franklin and Marshall.

Call Special Meeting
His theological training was received at the Crozier Theological seminary in Chester, Pa., after which he took post-graduate work at the Divinity School of the University of Chicago.
George Goodwin, chairman of the pulpit committee of the local church, stated that, after investigating and interviewing a large number of candidates from all over the country, he and other members of the committee, agreed unanimously on Mr. Kontz.
The candidate pastor conducted the full schedule of Sunday services and the mid-week services on Wednesday.

Church Recital to Feature Violinist

At the musical Vespers services of Christ Church Cathedral Sunday, August Magnuson, violin master at the Cranbrook school of music, will give a recital accompanied by Philip Malpas, church organist. The service, which is held at 4:30, follows the carillon concert given by August Maelkelberghe.
