

New Water Mains To Provide Better Fire Protection

City commissioners were in accord Monday night with the recommendation made by City Manager Donald C. Egbert, for the construction of two 8-inch mains on Dixie and Yankee from Maple to Villa roads.

"We know that the present 4-inch mains are not adequate for fire protection," Egbert stated, "and the Chief of the Birmingham Fire Department has requested the installation of more adequate fire protection in this area. He has requested this several times."

"Some of the fire hydrants are not readily available for use as there is no easy access to them at present installed."

PROPER REQUIREMENTS

According to Egbert, to meet requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters would require the installation of 6-inch mains on Yosemite from Adams to Columbia and on Villa from Adams to Yankee and 8-inch mains on Dixie and Yankee from Maple to Villa.

This installation would involve the property owners in large assessments and the city's proportionate cost would also be large. If a 12-inch main is installed on Maple and 8-inch mains on Dixie and Yankee from Maple to Villa, the 4-inch mains would serve for local supply to the residences in the area and a fire hydrant having an adequate supply could be located at each intersection, Egbert said.
