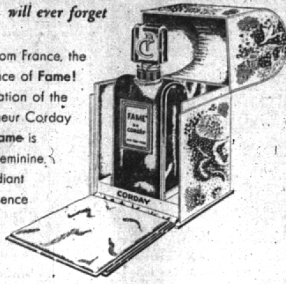

Mrs. Mary Griffin Newton will be the guest speaker at the opening meeting. She will speak on books for children. Mrs. Newton will have with her a large display of books, about 100 of them, which she will use to illustrate her discussion.

Hobby Becomes Profession

Mrs. Newton is one of those women who have made a profession out of a hobby, and is one of the country's leading authorities on children's books. For the past eight years she has been on a program over station WEXL, where she is known as "The Book Lady." She has a book review program for Detroit papers.

Each year Mrs. Newton holds a "sammy book sale" in her home, at which time she displays about 1,500 books, both old favorites and new books for children which have won wide acclaim in recent months. This private show is attended by her group leaders, librarians and library students, from all parts of the state. It is the best bargain sale to go to Birmingham fully prepared to give a complete picture of the children should have from the cloth book for the toddler through the category to the top-ranking junior encyclopedia.

Question Period

Since most of the parents who will attend this meeting have children under six, Mrs. Newton will confine her discussion mainly to the books suitable for this age group. A question period is planned for those who wish information about books which range beyond this bracket, however.
