Present Policy is costly

"That is our present policy in permanently improving side streets themselves, because we feel that the residents in the middle of the block also benefit from the use of the street," the manager pointed out.

He also suggested that the proposed charter amendment include the stipulation that once a sidewalk was put in, that the city would maintain it if it needed repairs.

"Our present plan of trying to determine whether the property owner or the city should pay for that repair is too costly a procedure. The city and the public would benefit financially if this arrangement were provided," Egbert added.

After the commission approved of the charter amendment it tabled the Cambridge sidewalk petition until after the voters expressed themselves at next April's election.

City Will Trade 10 Lots to School for Right-of-Way

Ten 40-foot lots on East Lincoln, just east of Eton road, will be traded by the city to the Birmingham school board for the right-of-way necessary to put Lincoln avenue through between Eton and Torrey, city commissioners decided Monday evening.

The 10 city-owned lots, when transferred to the school board, will permit it to erect a school bus garage on the site.

It was pointed out that both the city and school will have to deed the property if they are to trade, to the State Land Office Board, which in turn will return the respective pieces of land to the other party.

Commissioners instructed City Manager Donald C. Egbert and City Attorney F. A. S. Hascall to prepare the necessary papers for the transfer of the 10 city lots.

New Card Marking Plan at Baldwin

A completely revised system of card marking made its appearance last week at Baldwin High School when report cards were distributed to students at the end of the first six weeks' period.

According to the new system, every student is given a separate report card for each of his studies and is marked not only on scholastic ability but also on his attitude in class.

A homework card is also given listing citizenship ratings and extra-curricular activities.

Explains Change

Explaining the changes, Ross A. Wagner, principal, said "It has been felt for some time that there was needed a report card which attempted to evaluate the achievement of the student in terms of all of the objectives of the school. The old card which only evaluated academic achievement was inadequate."

"The new card attempts to give some consideration to the evaluation of citizenship traits as well as to evaluation of academic achievement. In other words, an effort is made in the new card to evaluate the total student."

The students' first reaction to the change was summed up by one boy who said, "It's been hard enough to get one card signed. What are we going to do with five or six of them?"
