

Vassar Club to Hear Miss Jane Jackson

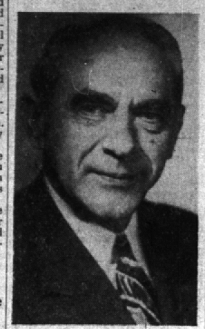

The program, "In One Year—A World of Experience" will be given at the Baldwin high school beginning at 8 o'clock. Hedke is well known through his world travels and through his connections with Rotary International, which he has served in the past as director, district governor, committee chairman and member. He is the vice-president and managing director of the Easton-Clark company in Detroit. During the past year he has traveled extensively through Europe, and has first hand knowledge of postwar conditions as they are today in France, Belgium, Switzerland, Holland, Czechoslovakia, England, Scotland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and other countries of the Continent.

His talk will include many highlights of the conditions he found there, and of what the peoples themselves are trying to do and are doing, to get their countries into a wholesome condition again.
