City Recent Case
I have listened to the complaints and experiences of many of the well informed class, and others who take serious notice of some fellow whose success reached no further than a small vegetable plot. As an instance, I refer to one episode of your recent date, and if somewhat tedious, should sound a warning note.
The owner of a glorious "Magnolia" was advised that the carnation was an excellent fertilizer for said specimen, which failed to bloom as luxuriantly last spring. In May four large fish were dug in around the roots. Magnolia lost flavor and bid farewell. A garbage can is still a safer storage tank for decayed refuse and the collector more valuable than you may think.
Just a word more about pruning of Evergreens. Unless you positively know when and how, let someone else do the job.
Lawn Seeding and Care
There are only two kinds of lawns in my book—either a good one or a headache. Once a good lawn is properly established it is not an expensive feat to maintain. True enough, noxious weeds may seed in from the weedy pasture of your neighbor, but are not difficult to eradicate with well known liquid sprayer compounds at very modest expense.
There are commercial mixtures that may kill dandelions of the dwarf species, but the large common fellow is a tough competitor. One sure way is to pull out root and all, fill hole with new earth and sprinkle grass seed. If in bloom, burn the pulled plants or the bloom will develop and blow abroad.
Probably there is no more difficult weed to control than crab grass. This fellow will take root from mower cuttings if left on your lawn. A sure method of eradication often advised is the use of carbolic acid, but is not only expensive but may cover a period of several seasons, at least, of back-breaking effort.
A solution of a recently developed mixture of liquid chemical
