

Barnes on World Security Program Sunday Afternoon

Russell Barnes of Randall court, news commentator from WWJ, The Detroit News, was among the guests on Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's first broadcast of the World Security Workshop series Sunday. The broadcast originates with the American Broadcasting Co., and was relayed over WWJ through special arrangement, and came from the study of Mrs. Roosevelt's home at Hyde Park.

Barnes answered Mrs. Roosevelt's query concerning the charges many are making against our American papers of warmongering.

"I do not believe this is true," he said. "The reporters are simply telling things as they are and as

they see them. It is true that it is not always a pretty picture, nor flattering to foreign powers, but I doubt that any American paper would be guilty of making war. As you know, reporters and editors have to go out and fight, just like anyone else, and they also have sons who would have to get into uniform.

"Some people think these things should not be printed. That would be digging the grave of Freedom of the Press. It would also be giving the country a picture of a very false security. The people must know the exact conditions in order to be fully aware of the problems their representatives here and abroad are facing. No, these things must be printed, and it is most unfair to accuse our papers of warmongering. War is the last thing any man, in his right mind, wants."

Others on the broadcast were Brig-Gen. Charles P. Romulo, head of the Philippine delegation to the UN and Sven Aman, Swedish correspondent.

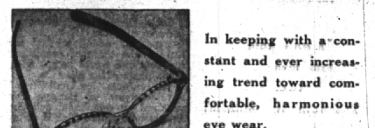
