The public is invited to attend and is asked to use the southwest entrance to the school.

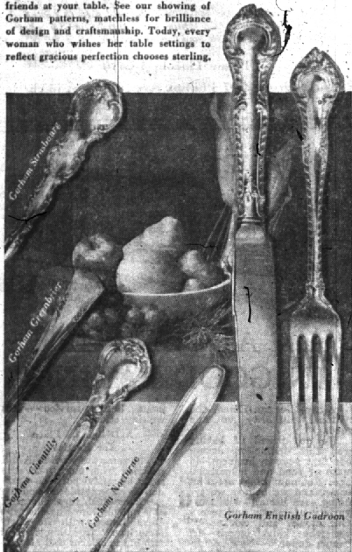
Troop B-1 is sponsored by the Men's Club of the First Presbyterian Church.

Demonstration
Mrs. Mabel Lange Smith, supervisor of art in the Detroit schools, kept her audience of forty Girl Scout leaders on the edge of their chairs as they watched her transform commonplace materials like shredded tissue paper into a white rabbit, and a butter carton into a tambourine tinkling with bottle tops, in her demonstration of art and crafts for Girl Scouts at the Community House on Friday, Sept. 19.

Mrs. Smith emphasized the use of ordinary materials found in every home, like newspaper, which she made into paper pulp, or used in strips to create masks. Miniature authentic period furniture made from cigar boxes with a coping saw, a raffia embroidered work basket ingeniously devised from the crown of Dad's old straw hat, and cardboard cruisers which were formerly laundry boxes, were a few of the many articles she demonstrated and explained that can be used by Scout leaders in their programs.

"We are all anxious to go home and mix powdered asbestos or string a loom," said Mrs. Cassius Miller, chairman of the afternoon, as she expressed the appreciation of the Birmingham Girl Scout Council for Mrs. Smith's graphic presentation.

Cranbrook Model to Give Gallery Talk on Saturday

Starting Saturday, September 27th and continuing until Monday, October 19th, the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art will exhibit the collection of Miss Cleo Dorman, a resident of Detroit, who is an art model at the Cranbrook Academy of Art.

Saturday afternoon at four o'clock the opening day of her exhibition, Miss Dorman, or "Cleo" as she is known professionally, will give a gallery talk to which anyone interested in contemporary art is especially invited. Her topic will be "A Model Looks at Art" and she will relate her experiences in this field.

Her exhibition features the work of students and contemporary artists for whom she has posed from various states and art schools. Some of the artists whose work is included in this exhibition are: David Lauder, of Los Angeles; Francis Chapin of Chicago; Carlos Lopez of Ann Arbor; David Friedman and Raphael Soper of New York and Ivan Mestrovic of Syracuse.

Scouts Career in Detroit
Six miniature by well-known artists highlight the collection. Landscapes, still lifes, prints and drawings, for some of which the exhibitor posed, are being shown. The fifty pieces in the collection were acquired as gifts or in exchange for professional services, and was started because of the model's interest in comparing the manner in which the various artists depicted her.

"Cleo" started her career as an art model in Detroit and in addition to posing at the Cranbrook Academy of Art has worked at the Buffalo School of Fine Arts, Art Students League in New York, the University of Southern California, Scripps College in California, Carnegie Institute of Technology, Otis Art Institute in Los Angeles, Cornell University, Syracuse University and the University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee.

Daily Exhibition
During the war, "Cleo" temporarily deserted her modeling career and served as a medical technician and assistant ward officer at DeWitt General Hospital at Auburn, Calif. and the Presidio at San Francisco as a member of the armed forces.

Hearing students' work criticized in art classes led "Cleo" to try drawing and painting which she found so absorbing that after the completion of this term she plans to devote all of her time to the pursuit of an art career, being particularly interested in design and decoration.

Her collection will be on exhibition at the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art daily, except Mondays, between two and five.

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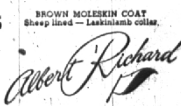
