## Beauty and Cleanliness Impress Sweden Visitor

Mr. and Mrs. Hans Schjolin of Redding returned from Sweden a few weeks ago where they spent seven weeks. They were guests of the former's mother, Kaga for several days, and later spent two weeks at the Grand Hotel in Stockholm. The rest of their time there was spent touring the country.

In telling of her trip, Mrs. Schjolin said the first thing that strikes the tourist is the overall cleanliness of the country. The streets, buildings, even the lakes, have a newly cleaned appearance.

"In Sweden," she said, "there are no slums as we know them here. The poorer people live in the older sections of the city, where the buildings are close together and the streets narrow, but nowhere does one see squalor and filth as in the poorer sections of our own country."

Plenty of Food  
There are no sections here which show dire want. Food, while strictly rationed, is plentiful. The restaurants are still serving the delicious and huge meals for which the country has long been famous, but they are serving in such a manner that no scraps of food is sent back on the plates. Portions are carefully measured, and, in fact, one may designate the amount of food he wishes.

Restaurants, too, must collect ration coupons for food served, and because of this Mrs. Schjolin had a rather amusing and somewhat embarrassing experience. While shopping alone one day she became hungry and decided on a ham sandwich. The ham another, for one coupon, the ham another, she went on being hungry.

Liquor, too, is rationed there, and the only way one can order a drink is to buy an entire meal. There are plenty of wineries, none of which are particularly good, and all means show a very fairly complete listing of popular American-made liquors.

Two other things strike the visitor strongly, Mrs. Schjolin said. One is the scarcity of dogs, the other the out-and-out honesty of the people.

Dog licenses are \$50 each, so the man who owns a dog does so because he really loves the animal. It is never seen roaming the streets, unfed and uncared for.

While there the couple visited many museums, and were impressed by the unobtrusive way they were allowed to roam through them. There were no crowds, no guides. In one, a four-story building, the only attendant was a little old lady on the first floor who took tickets.

Honesty of Citizens  
No one else prepared to let the building, which was filled with articles of historical value and were practically priceless. They were not enclosed, but stood on tables and shelves where they could be picked up and examined closely if the visitor desired.

They, themselves, had an experience which proved the basic honesty of the country. Upon getting ready to continue their trip one morning, Mr. Schjolin discovered he did not have the keys to his car. A search of their room did not reveal them, and with many doubts they went to the lobby to inquire.

"Yes," they were informed, "the keys were there." Someone, passing the car during the night, had noticed the keys in the door. They locked the car and brought them to the desk for the owner to pick up the next morning. The car was filled with luggage, cameras, etc.

Life Serene, Unburied  
There are not a great many laws in Sweden, but those they have are rigidly enforced, and apply to rich and poor alike. The part a man plays in the political life of the country, the money he has, the position he holds, make no difference at all in the treatment he receives if he runs afoul of the law.

Life is serene and unburied there. The people cannot understand the hustle and bustle of America, feeling that they are able to accomplish just as much in their mode of living, and have far more time in which to enjoy life than Americans have. Their meals are little ceremonies, each complete unto itself. One may spend an entire evening in a restaurant dining and listening to superb music, for even the smallest villages have a hotel with an orchestra in the dining room.

Sweden is a friendly country where courtesy predominates and the visitor cannot ask a favor that is not granted cheerfully and promptly. In spite of the fact that war, and are now feeding Finland, it is also a gay country. Nearly every home has the blue and gold flag of Sweden flying over it, giving villages and cities a festive air at all times.

Imports Are Reduced  
The nation is digging in, as one man, to recover from the effects of the war as swiftly and as completely as possible. They are taking every step to eradicate every sign of it, and are struggling to make it the nation it has been in the past.

One thing they are doing is cutting imports as much as possible, turning every bit of industry into their own country and doing away with labor problems and unemployment.

To import an American car, one must have an "import license." These are given by the government and are kept in close check. Mr. and Mrs. Schjolin saw hundreds of American cars on the docks which had been ordered and the license was not being issued.

Offer Fabulous Sums  
Several offered them fabulous sums for their car, but could not buy it for this same reason. One wealthy farmer actually cried as he talked of how much he would like to buy the machine.

In summing up her trip, Mrs. Schjolin said, "Yes, I liked Sweden. I like the way they do things there, the way they preserve what they have, for example, their forests. For every tree that is cut down a new one is planted. No where do you see barren stretches of what was once woodland. Their farms are the same, every inch is cared for and used. Their cities and villages, the beautiful canals, the lakes and castles, the palace grounds, everything is cared for beautifully and everything is motionless. However, I don't think I'd like to live there. There isn't enough to do to occupy an American there. While their life is comfortable and gracious, it just isn't what I like."
