President Adams will open the meeting, after which Jerry Hughes, Birmingham Congress president, will speak. Coach Secotine will follow and Barnes' address will complete the morning half of the affair.

Luncheon will be served with Whitney as speaker. The afternoon's program will consist of discussion groups followed by a general business meeting at the close of the day.
