

U of M Musical Society Arranges Concert Series

Twenty-six concerts by world-renowned musical celebrities will be heard under the auspices of the University Musical Society, in

Ann Arbor, according to an announcement recently made by Charles A. Sink, president and administrative head. In order to provide opportunities for hearing the best music, an extra series of five concerts has been scheduled as follows: Patricia Mysel, distinguished young American Metropolitan Opera soprano will make her Ann Arbor debut October 18. George Szell will bring his Cleveland Orchestra on Novem-

ber 9; on December 2, the Don Cosulich Chorus under the leadership of Eugene Cosulich will be heard; and on February 15, Dimitri Mitropoulos will bring the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra to Hill Auditorium; Alexander Brailowsky will be heard in a piano recital on March 10.

Choral Union Series
In the Sixty-ninth Annual Choral Union Series, ten programs will be given. Zinka Milanov, October 8; Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Arthur Rodzinski, conductor, October 26; Daniel Ericourt, French pianist, November 4; Set Svanholm, Swedish tenor, November 12; Westminster Choir, John Finley Williamson, conductor, November 24; Boston's "Masthead" will be presented twice—Saturday evening, December 13, and Sunday afternoon, December 14. The University Choral Union, a special organization with distinguished soloists, Frances Yeend, soprano;

Mary Van Kirk, contralto; Harold Haugh, tenor; Mark Lovell, bass; will be heard. Frieda Opi Holst Vogen will be at the organ. The performances will be under the direction of Lester McCoy.

May Festival Dates
On January 16 and 17, 1948, the Pennant String Quartet will give three concerts in the Rackham Building on Friday evening, Saturday afternoon and evening. The Fifty-fifth Annual May Festival will take place on April 29 and 30 and May 1 and 2. Six concerts will be given. The Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene O'Malley and Alexander Hilberg, the University Choral Union under Thor Johnson, the Youth Chorus under Marguerite Hood, and a group of soloists, both vocal and instrumental, will participate. Choral works will include Mozart's Great Mass in C Minor and Rachmaninoff's "The Bells."

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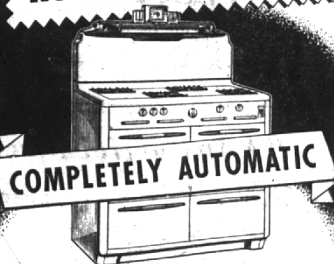
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
