Lathrup Townsite Protective Association will be known as the "Townsite Association" in the future, it has been announced.

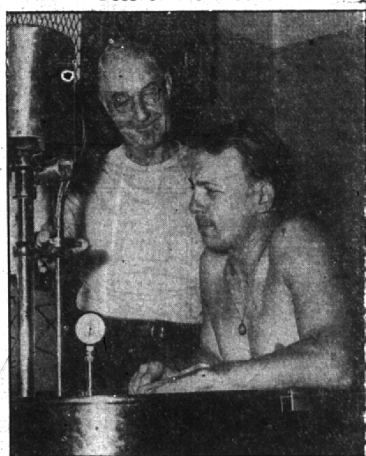

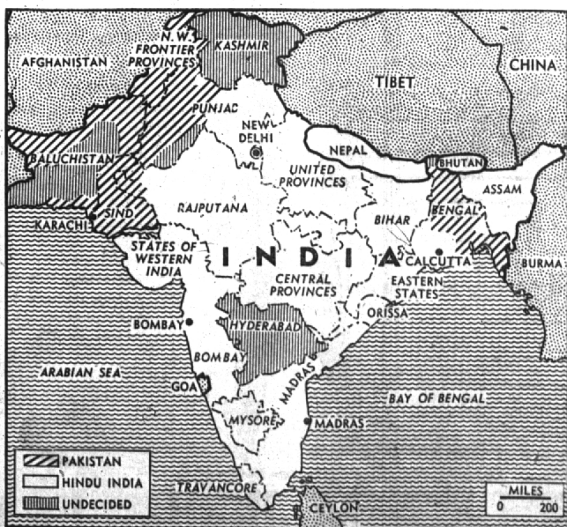

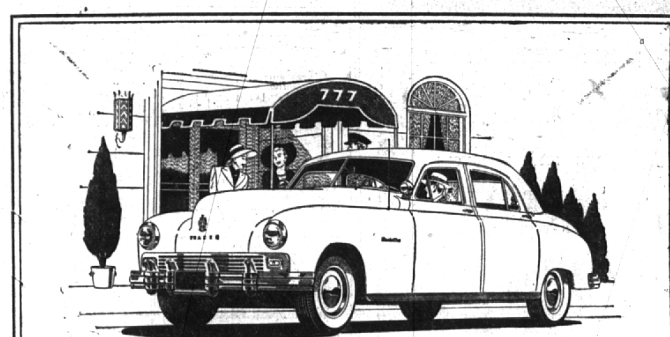
